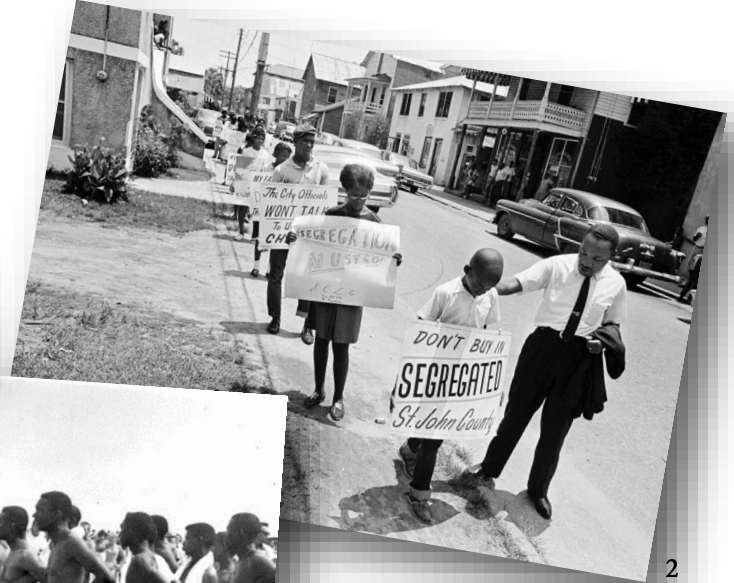


City of St. Augustine Historic Preservation Grant Project:

National Register Nomination of Sites Associated with the St. Augustine Civil Rights Movement

About the Project:

The City of St. Augustine received grant funding in the amount of \$50,000 from the Florida Division of Historical Resources to prepare a Nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for buildings and sites associated with the Civil Rights Movement in the St. Augustine area. The National Register is the official list of historical places worthy of preservation. A property may be listed if it maintains integrity and has defined significance related to architecture, ethnic heritage, community planning or development. The nomination will provide a comprehensive record of St. Augustine's Civil Rights Movement in the National Register and recognize the history of the buildings and sites connected with the historical event and those that contributed to the movement.

Public outreach and engagement will be a critical component of the project. A consultant, Historic Property Associates, Inc., has been hired to conduct the necessary research and documentation for this nomination with the cooperation of City Staff and the general public. Please join us for this public meeting to discuss the National Register nomination process, a preliminary list of sites and buildings identified as significant to the Civil Rights Movement, and provide your input on the project. Over the next several months, the consultant will prepare the nomination and come back to the public for a final meeting about the completed project.
