**St. Augustine Views and Voices:
Identity, Environmental Change and Adaptation**
Final Report on Online & Phone Surveys
conducted by Flagler College
in collaboration with City of St. Augustine
November 2021 - January 2022

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Introduction

Between Nov. 19 and Dec. 17, 2021, an online survey was distributed to City of St. Augustine residents titled *St. Augustine Views: Identity, Environmental Change and Adaptation*. The purpose of the survey was to collect qualitative feedback on conceptions of a (place-based) St. Augustinian identity, gain historical/current knowledge from residents on observed/experienced environmental changes and impacts, gather perception levels regarding threat of climate change and adaptation and to provide Flagler College students with an opportunity to engage in qualitative research. The online study provided the foundation of an analysis conducted by the students for the January 2022 course, *Climate Change Archives: Stories of Place, Memory & Identity in St. Augustine*. As part of the two-week intensive course, students further investigated online data findings by conducting phone interviews between Jan. 6 to Jan. 9, 2022.


Notes on Survey Data

- A maximum of 176 respondents participated in the online survey
- Respondents could respond to as many/few of the prompts as they chose
- Responses were submitted anonymously
- Twenty residents participated in the phone surveys


Respondent Clusters by Neighborhoods


“Hideous, cheap, and ugly hotels have sprung up crowding the once open-air feeling.”


“20 years ago we would annually get at least two good freezes... now that too has changed and we have mangroves overtaking our salt marshes.”


"I always thought this would be my home."

Survey Prompt - Do you feel you have the resources (financial or otherwise) to remain in St. Augustine as the city adapts to the impacts of environmental change?




Probably/Yes, definitely= 72

“Although I don’t want to leave St. Augustine, I am already thinking about moving before my house value goes down.”

“We have the resources to stay. We’ll have to raise our house in a few years, though.”

“Staying here means being tolerant of the nuisances.”

“I consider myself lucky to have the resources to stay. Adapting means raising homes and learning more about plants.”

“No, I don’t have the option to raise my house. I’m on a concrete slab.”

“I have the resources I need, but a lot of disadvantaged communities around here don’t.”

“I have a good income, job and business. I live in an historic building that cannot be raised. There are no resources for that.”



Summary: Takeaways & Insights

- Most respondents (90% or 110/122 respondents) have noticed environmental/geographical changes to St. Augustine since residence began.
- “Flooding” was selected most often (91 count or selections) as the environmental effect experienced in St. Augustine, followed by hotter temperatures (44 count) frequent/extreme natural disasters (41 count).
- When respondents reported on observed/experienced environmental changes to St. Augustine within the survey’s open comment fields, 44 comments reflected themes beyond those focused on climate change and related to quality of life, including overdevelopment, population density, tourism, loss of land and cutting down of trees, excessive traffic, burdens on infrastructure and hotel proliferation.
- When respondents were asked to describe their relationship to land/water in St. Augustine, most (99 count or selections) selected “The land/water is a fragile resource that I should try to protect” followed by “The land/water is the home of my community of people” (41 count) and “The land/water is a place of religious or spiritual connection for me” (38 count).
- 75% of respondents (88/118) report that they are either “more than somewhat” or “very” concerned about climate change impacts to St. Augustine.
- According to survey respondents, the top places of cultural significance include: Downtown, Bayfront, Lighthouse and Beaches.
- 61% (72/118) report either “Probably” or “Yes, definitely” to the question, “Do you have the resources—financial or otherwise—to adapt to environmental change impacts?”
- Most respondents (58%) report that they know others who have moved due to environmental change impacts.

Data was analyzed utilizing qualitative research methods and from those findings emerged a portrait of St. Augustinian identity, in the context of environmental change impacts. See below.
