Welcome to the break room and thanks for tuning in. I'm **Melissa Wissel**, communications director for the City of Saint Augustine.

Every year, the city Commission recognizes individuals for outstanding service and contributions to the city by way of presenting awards in the month of May to coincide with historic Preservation Month. The Adelaide Sanchez Award is presented. There are two categories, one for historic preservation and restoration, and the other this year's.

Honoree category is for historic education and interpretation. Each of those citizen awards, which were created over many years, carries with it distinct criteria which must be met.

And they are nominated by a commissioner and confirmed by unanimous vote of the Commission this year. Commissioner Barbara Blonder nominated Regina Gayle Phillips for the 2024 Adelaide Sanchez Award for Historic Education and Interpretation on May 13th, the City Commission presented Gayle with the prestigious.

Commemorative marble lion statue and in studio this week I have the pleasure to introduce Gayle Phillips. Gayle, congratulations and welcome to the break room.

I do want to start with your current role as Executive Director of the Lincolnville Museum and Cultural Center. It's located there in the heart of Lincolnville. Tell us about the museum and the work that you do there.

Well, we have the job of telling the story of some of the earliest black history in America in the Lakeville Museum. So we cover about 5 centuries, pretty much of black history here in America. So we tell those stories through interactive exhibits we have.

Educational programs there we also have a Cultural Center, which is a part of our name and that program, we do documentary screenings, a lot of different kinds of things. One of the other things we are doing there is also the historic preservation of that facility, which is almost 100 years old, and we're going to kick off our 100th anniversary.

This year in June, going up to June at 2025 will be one.

Years, but we're going to do that during our Juneteenth celebration this year, which will be on actually our heritage luncheon this year is on June 15th and we're actually having it off site at the Renaissance Hotel here in Saint Augustine because we weren't sure who would be under construction at that time. So we're having it off site, but we have an array of programs.

In the month of June, a lot of commemorative dates for the 60th anniversary of the civil rights movement here in Saint Augustine from the summer of 64, when Doctor King, doctor Martin Luther King Junior was here, and a lot of protests took place leading up to this.

Black history not just to be celebrated during Black History Month.

Right year round and and that's all part of what we do. I mean, we're open now, we're open, you know, every day, seven days a week. So you know we have a lot of history that we cover and but this year we are celebrating throughout the city of Saint Augustine.

Throughout Saint Johns County, I should say the 60th anniversary of, you know, revisiting the summer of 64, which was very.

But I will take this opportunity to champion the committee that you were sitting on as you were a part of, you were appointed by the Florida Speaker of the House of Representatives, Paul Renner, to serve on the Florida Museum of Black History Task Force. It was created by Governor DeSantis and we have been named.

For recommendation, we want to be very careful to say we've hasn't officially been finalized, but Saint Augustine was named for recommendation by that Task force to be the location for the Black History Museum in Florida. Tell us about sitting on that.

Board at had to have been exciting, challenging all of the above Nashik hand ringing and congratulations to you for being named on that. And I I'll just give a a congratulations to us

collectively on that. The county has has been named forward you know been set forward to do that so.

Black history here in Saint Augustine that we have really worked hard to tell the world about to tell, you know, to really push it out. And we're starting to get a lot of national recognition for the earliest black history in not just Florida, but in the entire nation, right. And so to have that museum, you know, poised to come to Saint Augustine.

No, it's not a done deal yet. I don't want people to just celebrate too soon because it still has to go through that final recommendation and then we are just a task force of Community people from throughout the state of Florida, some elected officials, some are just serving different capacities throughout the Community.

That will make a recommendation, and then it still also has to get funded through the legislature to be constructed and then a plan. You know, our plan was to come up with a recommendation on how and where. And you know how it can become self-sustaining and that's what we've been working on almost a year.

You know, and what the other cities, I mean, we were in the running with some pretty tough.

Cities. Wonderful places. Yeah. So, but I think, you know, the the task force selected, we narrowed it down to four. We started I think with 13 presentations from different locations. Some just didn't make a lot of sense at all, to be honest with you. And so 8 presented formal.

So not just those 3.

Applications to be considered and out of those eight, we ranked the top four and then we did another ranking down to the top three and this past week the vote came in that we would take the top ranked museum and give that as a recommendation to the.

Governor. And so there's still, you know, other two, the two other places that were in.

Or Eatonville which you know has a really good claim to be a location. I think it's a wonderful idea. It was the first in.

Well, there's still a couple more, but the first incorporated Black City in the country that goes back to the 18, I think 70s. OK. But we also had Opa-locka in South Florida, so two locations with high traffic area.

Saint Augustine, little as traffic, but a lot more history and a lot more people who come just for.

So a lot of people come through here because we are, you know, the northeast part of the where we have Fort Mosaic. We haven't met. To me that's like a huge.

It was the first free black settlement, first sanctioned black settlement in in the country and I don't think that we can overlook that. I think that, you know, we had a lot of people who have a lot of historians who have worked on making sure that that history gets told we're the only UNESCO site.

Ohh, really? Yes, four hose in the state so.

That's incredible. That takes a lot of work to.

It does and and and so it's very significant. It is a site, you know, that's sanctioned by the United Nations. So it's kind of big. Yeah, it's pretty big. So, you know, it's not something that just sneeze at and say, oh, yeah, yeah. Well, even though it wasn't incorporated, it was still here.

It was one of those first places where people were really fighting to regain their freedom, that they came and they settled it. Fort Mosaic and that story is one that is being told.

Around the world, I mean, we were just in, you know, British press earlier this year talking about that story well and in and of itself. You know, Fort Mosaic has the Jazz Festival. They've done that. Now is it the three years, maybe two or three fundraiser for.

Network which is called ACORN, for that's their acronym and we have applied for a Reconstruction Era designation as well, which we have so much Reconstruction Era history. In Saint Augustine, you know the politicians who were here that lasted way beyond the official reconstruction.

Official period of reconstruction and up until the early 1900s. So we have a lot of stories to tell, but the museum that you were talking about, it's not going to be a local museum. I want people to

understand that it is a state museum. It will tell the stories from all over the state of Florida, which are awesome, all those.
